FIRST ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH BOARD MEETING Council Minutes – May 8, 2023 (not yet approved)

Members present: Pastor Denise Fossen, Kristi Ehrenberg (president), Marilyn Chindvall (vice president) and Lay Ministry, Becky Parker (treasurer), Kari Dorry-Youth & Family, Julie Schneider - Stewardship, Jane Debner - Evangelism, Kaitlyn Burdorf-Christian Education, Art Vollmer-Church Properties, and Barbara Wegner-Secretary.

Meeting was called to order by President Kristi Ehrenberg at 8:15 pm.

Approval of April Minutes. Kari & Becky MSP.

Approval of April Treasurer's Report. We had to go to the operating reserve in April, mainly because we had to pay for the copier we purchased. We're ahead of last year's general offering at this month. Marilyn & Julie MSP.

Board of Lay Ministry - Marilyn Chindvall - Approved the WAM & Endowment minutes. Kirsten Karels is the only one leaving. Michelle Bauer will go on the ballot. The board wants to get a safety committee started so Marilyn will work on gathering people and information for that. Kristi updated them on the youth leader applications - no active candidates. They discussed the idea of partnering with Trinity and Holden for a youth leader. The board likes WAM's suggestion of favorite hymns for the 3rd Sunday in June, July, and August in lieu of Contemporary services. People who have served coffee downstairs don't want to come in early to start another pot for those upstairs. Maybe we should scrap coffee for the summer. For the fall, several on our board would like to see coffee upstairs instead, which could be more comfortable and welcoming. Kristi said it might be

about half an hour to come early to brew coffee before service and it may be difficult to get volunteers for that. No one is against bringing your own coffee (with lids) into service. It was decided we'll have the Annual Election meeting June 25th.

Board of Evangelism – Jane Debner - The board made contact with Jackie Taffe at Fairway View to hold the summer monthly hymn sing on the 2nd Wednesday of June, July, and August at 4:00 pm. Kim ordered 60 carnation stems in a variety of pink colors. Kim & Deb will hand out the flowers following the May 14th church service. This will be the message that will go in the May 14th bulletin: "For all the mothers and the mothers-at-heart, HAPPY Mother's Day! Flowers will be handed out as you leave church today by the Evangelism committee." The directory will be re-evaluated in the fall. New Member Sunday will be September 17th. Kim created a photo illustration ring binder information guide for using the Facebook Link at Fairway View Orpheum for church services due to some past technical difficulties. This binder should help a lot. The board is tabling discussion on Mission Emphasis Sunday which will be held in the fall.

Christian Education – Kaitlyn Burdorf - For Vacation Bible School (which is July 23rd to 27th) the times the board chose were 2:00-7:00 pm for Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and 4:00-7:00 pm for Thursday. The programs are on Thursday so this way the families can have supper before the programs. The other 3 days can have brunch and snacks. Marge will host all 3 counselors. Sunday School's last day will include an ice cream Sunday bar, games, & a devotional. Jennifer is done. Sara Wollschlager said she will join.

Youth & Family - Kari Dorry - No one can attend the Synod Assembly. Gayla has one more year, Kari will continue on the board, Kelsey will not continue and needs to be replaced. Since Nancie helped in the past and is gone, the board would like to add two more members. The board was wondering what the coffee coordinator job entails. Kristi explained that she has left a sign-up sheet out in the Fellowship Hall. If no one has signed up, then she tries to contact people (who said they would volunteer in this way on the Opportunity Sheets that Barbara compiled) to see if they can volunteer on that particular day. If they're not available then she filled in. The board was wondering if there was a need for a coffee coordinator at all. They said maybe we could just have the sign-up sheet and if no one signs up then there is no coffee that day. There was discussion on if there was no coffee coordinator who would handle snacks for Sunday School. Some people may think it's more difficult of a job than it really is. Kristi may stand up in church and discuss what the job entails so people know. Barbara was thanked for her part in getting the treats and coffee supplies to the church before the weekend. If there was coffee upstairs then there would have to be rearranging of furniture and needing portable tables that could be removed for funerals and the like. The servers would have the benefit of being able to watch the service on the TVs while in the Narthex. More information on service points is needed, but it sounds like a good idea that children should get points for helping to serve. They will reach out to Kirsten and Liz for more information on the points. Children who get points will be able to save money on trips in the future, but no one there knew how much a point is worth in dollars. They want to continue with the adopt-a-highway project. There have been a lot of helpers so this board will join the Board of Education to thank all the helpers who have made this year go off without a hitch. It would be great to work with other churches for a youth leader position. They'd like more information on summer camps and mission trips. Barbara receives some of this and discusses with Liz if it's worth sharing. They can pass info to the board if there are more opportunities.

Stewardship – Julie Schneider - They will put something in the bulletin about online giving so that people who vacation can still consistently give while absent, something like, "Don't let your offering go on vacation." Kristi wondered how to edit her automatic donation. Concerning the Facebook issue, Julie said maybe it would be safer if the church posted some information on its Facebook page that said, "We accept, acknowledge, and read all comments, but we won't respond to all of them," so that no one will feel slighted. The church does respond to private messages. Barbara mentioned that there is no place to put that on our page except in a pinned post, and our pinned post right now is about looking for a youth leader. Kristi mentioned that we don't have to place it on our Facebook post but maybe in our newsletter that this will be our practice to not expect a response so no one feels slighted if they don't get one. The issue that they were discussing was about one person not receiving a "like" and did not have to do with anyone not receiving a comment response. The church could give a broad response (not to any individual) that says, "Thank you all for your comments," rather than specifically liking or responding to each comment individually. No one is leaving the board this year.

Church Properties – Art Vollmer - Plunketts Pest Control was here today spraying outside for spiders and bugs. They gave Dean a quote of \$60 to spray the interior and he said to go ahead. Jackson street, between us and the courthouse, is scheduled for repair the middle of June. Dean called Larry's for air conditioning checkup. We had an ice dam and leaking in the storage and altar guild rooms. 2 banners were damaged. Brent called our North Star Insurance on the 10th. On the 11th the insurance adjustor came by, gathered information, and took pictures. We haven't heard back yet. Art, Dean, and Warren Wiese re-tiled the altar guild room. The other room should be worked on next week. Art contacted contractors for the Sidewalk sinkhole repair and hasn't heard back from them yet. Art will stay around until this insurance project with the roof and inside gets completed. Glen will call new board prospects. The roof quote came in for the side of the church's roof not covered by insurance. It was \$56,012.97. The board recommends doing it now because if you wait a year it might cost 70 thousand instead. Art motioned we repair the North half of the roof when they do the repair of the other half that will be covered by insurance so all of the shingling will be done from 2021-2023. We have \$52k in capital improvement because of the insurance payout for the first half. The original bid for the damaged roof half was \$41,971.31. We have a \$1000 deductible, so we have a check from the insurance for \$40,975.31 that is in the capital improvement fund. So we need about \$56k to fix the half not covered by insurance. Art will recommend that they fix it the best way they know how to shingle the whole roof. We have a parsonage fund where it could possibly come from. We will have to figure out where to get this money at a later time. We could put something in the bulletin mentioning the roof and asking for special offerings to help with that. Art & Kari MSP Dean said there wasn't much to do in terms of a spring cleanup so the board decided to scratch it. Julie was going to see if they could piggyback on Spring Cleaning to clean the kitchen & scrub the chairs. But they'll figure something else out.

PASTOR'S REPORT - We last met the Monday of Holy Week, April 3rd. Worship included the normal Holy Week services of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday. The senior choir and guest musicians' cantata was well done and well received. Easter had two well attended services that included Holy Communion. We tried 3 stations which worked well. We are in "Easter-tide" until Pentecost, May 28th this year. Marilyn Hanson and I selected hymns for May-June. Rostered leaders had a zoom meeting on April 17th with the bishop on the 5 themes Leaderwise hears that we discussed before our meeting tonight. There was also available a zoom for congregational leaders to attend. Confirmation students have been working on their class projects, final tests, and take-home lessons. I, in turn, have been creating and correcting lessons outside of class time. Pastoral care has increased with hospital visits, premarital counselling, and regular visits. Funeral for Richard G. Anderson is Tuesday, May 9th. I took a week of vacation the week after Easter and had a continuing education event Monday, April 24th. My next continuing education event, the Festival of Homiletics (preaching/worship) is May 15-21st. Synod Assembly is June 9-10th. I'll be travelling Thursday, June 8th in the afternoon.

Next council meeting will be on June 5th at 7:00 PM Motion to adjourn – Julie & Kaitlyn **MSP**. Closed with Lord's Prayer at 9:00 pm.

SHARING OF LOVE. DIGNITY. AND RESPECT



At the Sunday, April 23rd worship service at First English Lutheran Church, five Dignity Quilts were blessed. These quilts were sewn by members of the Day of Love. On Tuesday, at our Day of Love gathering, the quilts were presented to Stephanie Haukos and Misty Wittnebel, both of whom are with the Fairway View Nursing Home Neighborhoods. Three of the quilts have crosses and two of them are generic.

What is the purpose of a Dignity Quilt?

Dignity Quilts are a handmade quilt or coverlet that the Fairway View staff will carefully drape over a transport stretcher of a recently deceased patient before they are moved from their room. When the proper steps have been completed, they will proceed, with the family following, to the front door of the nursing home where their neighborhood friends and staff are gathered. It is here that there will be a brief reading and prayer by a staff member. The deceased will then be escorted with honor through the front door of Fairway View Neighborhoods by the funeral director and at which time the Dignity Quilt will be returned to a Fairway View Neighborhood staff member for the proper care.

All of these acts, are to offer a measure of comfort for the family, their neighborhood friends and staff AND more importantly provide a compassionate honor and dignity to the deceased serving as an important ritual at the end of life

as their family, friends, and staff at the neighborhood say goodbye. When you are a resident at Fairway view Neighborhoods, you enter through the front door and when you leave at the end of life, you will leave through the front door with dignity and honor. These quilts serve as a symbolism of our compassion and caring for one another. The Day of Love at First English Lutheran is happy to be a part of this important life ending process.



Decoration Day

What we now know as Memorial Day began as "Decoration Day" in the immediate aftermath of the U.S. Civil War. It was a tradition initiated by former slaves to celebrate emancipation and commemorate those who died for that cause. Yale University historian David Blight retold the story:

During the final year of the Civil War, the Confederates had converted the plantation owners' horse track in Charleston, South Carolina, known as the "Washington Race Course and Jockey Club," into an outdoor prison. Union



soldiers were kept in horrible conditions in the interior of the track; over 260 died of exposure and disease and were hastily buried in a mass grave behind the grandstand.

Roughly 28 black workmen went to the site, dis-interred the Union soldiers' bodies, gave them a proper burial, and built a high fence around the cemetery. They whitewashed the fence and built an archway over an entrance on which they inscribed the words, "Martyrs of the Race Course."

Then black residents of Charleston, in cooperation with some white missionaries and teachers, staged an unforgettable parade of 10,000 people on the slaveholders' race course. A New York Tribune correspondent witnessed the event, describing it as "a procession of friends and mourners the likes of which South Carolina and the United States had never seen before." At 9 a.m. on May 1, 1866, the procession started off led by 3,000 black schoolchildren carrying armloads of roses and singing "John Brown's Body." The children were followed by several hundred black women with baskets of flowers, wreaths, and crosses.

Then came black men marching in cadence, followed by contingents of Union infantry (including the 54th Massachusetts Regiment and other black Union regiments). They were followed by other black and white citizens. As many as possible gathered inside the cemetery enclosure; a children's choir sang "We'll Rally around the Flag," the "Star-Spangled Banner," and several spirituals before several black ministers read from scripture.

Other traditions developed in many communities – following the Civil War. It was the costliest war that the United States has ever endured in terms of US American lives lost. 600,000 to 800,000 soldiers died in this war ... because we were fighting among ourselves. National cemeteries were established at this time because there were so many soldiers to be buried, something had to be done.

May 30, 1868, was the first national observance of Decoration Day. It was held at Arlington National Cemetery. 100 years later in 1968, Memorial Day was established as a federal holiday and its observance was shifted to the last Monday of May.

As I looked through this history, I gained new insights for how we observe this holiday. Gratitude for freedom is where Memorial Day began. Gratitude to the men who fought and gave their lives in order to free people who had been enslaved for generations ... enslaved in a country that claimed in its Declaration of Independence: We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.

As we stand here and remember those who have died while serving in the armed services of the United States, we remember that they continued the fight for freedom ... a fight for freedom from oppression ... a fight for the freedom for ALL people.

And we also remember that when we fight amongst ourselves, those battles are extremely costly. Those who died in battle fought for the freedom of all people ... regardless of those things that so frequently divide us ... color, religion, national origin, gender, and so on. When we allow oppression of any kind, when we allow one group of people to control the lives of others, we show terrible disrespect for those who have fought and died in order to establish the freedoms our nation was founded upon and celebrates.

I imagine that folks gathered here expect a specifically Christian message, since I am a Christian pastor. Memorial Day is a federal holiday – not a Christian holy day – however. And as we remember those who have fought and died, we have to remember that they did not give their lives because they were Christian ... in fact, many of those who have died defending our freedoms were NOT Christian ... they were Muslim or Jewish or not affiliated with any religious group at all ... These brave men and women gave their lives because they were defending the freedoms that our Declaration of Independence and our Constitution say belong to ALL people – including freedom from the establishment of any religion.

I believe that Jesus crossed cultural and political lines to uphold the dignity of all people. So, while I do represent the Christian faith, I want to call upon you who are gathered here today and all people in our nation to remember that these soldiers made a commitment and a sacrifice that should bring us together, not divide us – especially on matters of faith. We should honor the memory of those who died to defend the freedoms of our nation, and we should follow in their footsteps to defend one another's freedom from oppression of any kind.

May we continue to live by the Declaration ... We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all people are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.
