August 13, 2023: Eleventh Sunday After Pentecost

Main Idea: Even and especially when it feels like Jesus has been distant for a while, he will seek you out and make his presence known to you. Jesus will always join you in the boat.

The story of Jesus walking on water is very similar to the story of Jesus calming the sea (Matthew 8:23-27). One thing that can help us keep the two separate and distinct is to define exactly what it was that frightened the disciples in their ship each time. In Matthew 8, the disciples' boat is at the mercy of a raging storm. They are in fear for their lives. Here, however, in Matthew 14, what scares them is the image of a phantom Jesus. Some strong winds are mentioned, but they are not scared of dying. They are scared of a ghost.

Why might this be? Perhaps the deepest and most understandable reason why the disciples were scared to see what they thought was Jesus's ghost is because they thought he had died. They thought he had left them. And seeing his ghost, they didn't know what they would do without him, where they would go, how they might carry on.

The promise in this text is that Jesus addresses and quiets that fear both immediately and in a couple of different ways. He was initially seeking the disciples out, but upon hearing the fear in Peter's voice, Jesus stops and allows for Peter to seek him, instead. Then, when that plan falters, Jesus steps into the instigator seat again and delivers Peter from danger.


Jesus joins the disciples in the boat and the storm is calmed. This is almost like a spiritual reset he is offering the disciples—the reassurance that he is present and ready to minister alongside them in the next town.

We need not fear or feel anxious if Jesus doesn't seem close by. This text tells us that he will always come seek us out.


Scripture Summary

The disciples are struggling with the wind, the boat, and their fear at seeing their teacher walking on the water like a ghost. Jesus' presence restores their faith and calms the storms within and without.





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First Reading: Genesis 37:1-4, 12-28

37 Jacob settled in the land where his father had lived as an alien, the land of Canaan. This is the story of the family of Jacob Joseph being asymptom Canaan. ²This is the story of the family of Jacob. Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. ³Now Israel loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves. 4But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him. ¹²Now his brothers went to pasture their father's flock near Shechem. ¹³And Israel said to Joseph, "Are not your brothers pasturing the flock at Shechem? Come, I will send you to them." He answered, "Here I am." 14So he said to him, "Go now, see if it is well with your brothers and with the flock; and bring word back to me." So he sent him from the valley of Hebron. He came to Shechem, ¹⁵and a man found him wandering in the fields; the man asked him, "What are you seeking?" 16"I am seeking my brothers," he said; "tell me, please, where they are pasturing the flock." ¹⁷The man said, "They have gone away, for I heard them say, 'Let us go to Dothan." So Joseph went after his brothers, and found them at Dothan. ¹⁸They saw him from a distance, and before he came near to them, they conspired to kill him. ¹⁹They said to one another, "Here comes this dreamer. ²⁰Come now, let us kill him and throw him into one of the pits; then we shall say that a wild animal has devoured him, and we shall see what will become of his dreams." ²¹But when Reuben heard it, he delivered him out of their hands, saying, "Let us not take his life." ²²Reuben said to them, "Shed no blood; throw him into this pit here in the wilderness, but lay no hand on him" —that he might rescue him out of their hand and restore him to his father. ²³So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe, the long robe with sleeves that he wore; ²⁴ and they took him and threw him into a pit. The pit was empty; there was no water in it. ²⁵Then they sat down to eat; and looking up they saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead, with their camels carrying gum, balm, and resin, on their way to carry it down to Egypt. ²⁶Then Judah said to his brothers, "What profit is it if we kill our brother and conceal his blood? ²⁷Come, let us sell him to the Ishmaelites, and not lay our hands on him, for he is our brother, our own flesh." And his brothers agreed. ²⁸When some Midianite traders passed by, they drew Joseph up, lifting him out of the pit, and sold him to the Ishmaelites for twenty pieces of silver. And they took Joseph to Egypt.

Psalm: Psalm 105: 1-6, 16-22, 45b

Second Reading: Romans 10:5-15

⁵Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that "the person who does these things will live by them." 6But the righteousness that comes from faith says, "Do not say in your heart, Who will ascend into heaven?" (that is, to bring Christ down) 7" or Who will descend into the abyss?"" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). 8But what does it say? "The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); 9because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. ¹⁰For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. 11The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." ¹²For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. ¹³For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." 14But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? ¹⁵And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

Gospel: Matthew 14:22-33

²²Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. ²³And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, ²⁴but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. ²⁵And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. ²⁶But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. ²⁷But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." ²⁸Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." ²⁹He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. ³⁰But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" 31Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" ³²When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. ³³And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."
