August 20, 2023: Twelfth Sunday After Pentecost

Main Idea: God doesn't want anything but earnestness from you.

Verses 21-28 of this Matthew text are deeply uncomfortable to read. However we interpret them, one thing is clear—Jesus and his disciples were rude (and, frankly, prejudiced) to a Canaanite woman who was begging them for help healing her possessed daughter. However, when they are prefaced by verses 10-20, an interesting thought experiment arises. Starting in Verse 10, Jesus tells the crowd gathered around him that what goes into the mouth cannot defile, but what comes out of the mouth can. In essence, Jesus is endorsing a purity of heart here. He is saying that you can't control your circumstances or the things that happen to you, so those things cannot define you. But you can control what you say and what kind of energy and intention you put into the world. So those things can define you. You can be held accountable to those things—the things that come from your heart.

This Canaanite woman is so driven by the love she has for her daughter and so genuinely faithful to what she knows of God's healing power that she does anything and everything she can to get her daughter help. She can't help that she was born and raised in a culture different from Jesus's. She can't help that she lives in a society where she is outranked by men. She can't help that her daughter was taken over by a demon. But she can control what she does about all of it. She can control what proceeds from her heart.


The things coming out of her mouth are things that build up faith and hope. She endures awkward and avoidant behavior from the disciples and from Jesus, and even engages them in conversation past a searing insult that Jesus throws her way because she believes that Jesus has what her daughter needs to get better. The things coming out of this woman's mouth are so good and so impactful that Jesus, himself, stops what he is doing and listens to her. He changes his mind about her.

Our words and our actions are the seeds from God that Jesus references in this passage—the seeds that God is planting. And while Jesus is encouraging us to speak to each other with earnestness, faith and intention, the Canaanite woman reminds us to speak to Jesus that way, too, even when it doesn't feel good. Her courage and slight cheekiness prove to us that authenticity resonates with God, and even helps to urge a response from God. Being intentional with what you put into the world can bring literal healing.

Scripture Summary

CIERGY SIUFF Jesus explained that words and actions have more ability to pollute or heal than what we put into our bodies. Then a Gentile woman challenges Jesus to heed his own words, and she is rewarded for her faith.

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First Reading: Genesis 45:1-15

 $45^{\rm Then}$ Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, "Send everyone away from me." So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. ²And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. 3 Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence. 4Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. Psalm: Psalm 133

Second Reading: Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32

1 I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. ²God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew. ²⁹For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. ³⁰Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, ³¹so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may now receive mercy. ³²For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

Gospel: Matthew 15: [10-20], 21-28

[10Then he called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: 11it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." 12Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" ¹³He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. ¹⁴Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." 15But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." ¹⁶Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? ¹⁷Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? ¹⁸But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. ¹⁹For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. ²⁰These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."] ²¹Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. ²²Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." ²³But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." ²⁴He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." ²⁵But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." ²⁶He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." ²⁷She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." ²⁸Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.
