Dear First English Lutheran church,

We are entering a Season of Change. After much prayer and discernment, we have resigned from our role as missionaries in the ELCA. Our last day with the ELCA will be October 31, 2025. We know this may come to many of you as a surprise. While this is a significant change, we hope that this does not mean that our relationship with you will come to an end.

And so before we explain, we want to say thank you. For walking with us these past 12 years. We have seen the work of God, in the midst of challenges and setbacks. The Lord has been with us, and so have you.

We have witnessed countless babies and children survive and go home with their parents, living with profound joy instead of sorrow because of this ministry that you have supported. Some of the many highlights of the past twelve years include: Transforming the NICU at Arusha Medical Lutheran Center (ALMC) into a leading NICU in East Africa.

Mentoring nurses and 20 doctors, who now work in pediatrics and neonatology throughout Tanzania and Africa.

Launching and hosting the annual "Tiny Feet, Big Steps" African Neonatology Conference and writing a Neonatology Handbook, through which vital knowledge has been passed onto medical teams from over 25 countries.

Developing nutritional education programs in a Maasai school and health centers in the rural areas of Arusha.

Building and sustaining a rehabilitation program for severely malnourished children. Treating so many Tanzanian children in clinic

While we are grateful for the financial gift of each congregation and individual, we have also enjoyed connecting personally with individual ELCA congregations. We've appreciated the opportunity to speak in your fellowship halls, enjoy meals with your outreach boards and in some cases, even stay in guest rooms in your houses! We also have taken great comfort knowing that you were lifting us up in prayer during your worship services.





A New Chapter

While we are ending our employment with the ELCA, we are continuing our work with infants, children and mothers in Arusha. We are not leaving Tanzania. We plan to continue on in the work we have been doing the past decade: training healthcare workers and fostering innovation in neonatology in ways that are specific to the African context.

In order to support and sustain this work, we have founded a non-profit organization called Institute for Child Healthcare Africa (ICHA). ALMC and ICHA are in discussions about how ICHA will assume operational and financial responsibility for running the Department of Pediatrics and the NICU at ALMC. ICHA is also developing the first free-standing specialty outpatient pediatric clinic in Tanzania. We have a Board in the USA and a local Tanzanian Board of Directors, and are registered as a 501(c)(3). This is a non-governmental, not-for-profit organization.

ICHA will continue to host the annual "Tiny Feet, Big Steps" conferences. We are preparing for the arrival of doctors and nurses from nearly 120 different medical facilities and 25 countries this November at our 5th African Neonatology Conference in Arusha. We have been invited to expand the conferences into other African countries and early December we will be running a Tiny Feet, Big Steps conference in Ethiopia! Next year we are looking to bring the conference to Ghana and Uganda, and have teaching opportunities across the continent.





Further Partnership

The ELCA invites you to continue in financial and prayer partnership with other missionaries on their staff. We wish to encourage this!

Daudi and Kellen Msseemmaa have been working in East Africa since 2019 as East African Representatives. They are involved in some wonderful work, strengthening relationships between ELCA churches and the partners in East Africa. Daudi also serves on the leadership board for the church and clinic of the Lutheran Mission in South Sudan. They have founded Empowered Girls, which teaches life skills to girls and builds supportive environments for their education. Thank you for all the work we have done in the past years together. We have been humbled by God's faithfulness and the times and places, just when we thought hope was lost, that Jesus showed up to give us strength to carry on.
